Chenoa: Home of the Historic Matthew T. Scott House on the National Register of Historic Places. Located at 227 N. 1st. Ave., it was built in 1855.




It's called Memory Lane, a section of the original Route 66 roadway, located in Lexington. The town was a popular stop for travelers between Chicago and St. Louis.



City Wide Spring Pick Up May 10, 2018

All items must be placed curbside by 6:00 a.m. on Thursday, May 10, 2018 for Waste Management pickup.

The City's annual pick up program is for residents living in single-family homes or duplexes that are currently receiving City collection services.

Items to be picked up include: couches, chairs, tables, mattress, white goods (i.e. ranges, washers, dryers, appliances with Freon, water heaters), automobile tires (limit of 4 with no rims), carpet and padding (all carpet & padding must be cut into 4-foot lengths, rolled and secured with tape or sting not to exceed 50 lbs).

No pick-up for building materials, fencing, large car parts, engine oil, and yard waste. To make special arrangements for pick up of these items call Waste Management directly at 1-800-796-9696.

Anyone hauling items into the City will be considered dumping and will be fined.

For further information regarding spring pick-up, please contact Waste Management at 1-800-796-9696.

As of January 1, 2012 the following items have been banned from disposal in Illinois: Televisions, Monitors, Printers, Computers (Desktops, Laptops, Notebooks, Tablets), Electronic Keyboards, Fax Machines, Videocassette Recorders, Portable Digital Music Players, DVD Players, DVD Recorders, Video Game Consoles, Small Scale Servers, Scanners, Electronic Mice, Digital Converter Boxes, Cable Receivers, Satelite Receivers, Cell Phones, Computer Cable, Portable Digital Assistants (PDAs) and Zip Drives. 2. To pay for services stipulated in paragraphs 1b, 1c, 1d, 1e, 1f, 1h, 1i & 1j at actual cost of performing such work plus percent to cover profit, overhead and readiness to serve - "actual cost" being defined as material cost plus, payrolls insurance, social security and retirement deductions. Traveling and other out-of-pocket expenses will be reimbursed to the ENGINEER at his actual cost. Subject to the approval of the LA, the ENGINEER may sublet all or part of the services provided under the paragraphs cited above. If the ENGINEER sublets all or part of this work, the LA will pay the cost to the ENGINEER plus a five (5) percent service charge. "Cost to Engineer" to be verified by furnishing the LA and the DEPARTMENT copies of invoices from the party doing the work. The classifications of the employees used in the work should be consistent with the employee classification for the services performed. If the personnel of the firm, including the Principal Engineer, perform routine services that should normally be performed by lesser-salaried personnel, the wage rate billed for such services shall be commensurate with the work performed.

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- 3. To pay for the services stipulated in paragraph 1I a sum of money equal to thirty-five (35) percent of the amount determined by multiplying the final contract cost by the percentage(s) set forth under paragraph 1a or 1b of THE LA AGREES.
- 4. That payments due the ENGINEER for services rendered in accordance with the AGREEMENT will be made as soon as practicable after the services have been performed, in accordance with the following schedule:
 - a. Upon completion of detailed plans, special provisions, proposals and estimate of cost being the work required by paragraph 1a through 1j under THE ENGINEER AGREES to the satisfaction of the LA and their approval by the Department, 90 percent of the total fee due for paragraphs 1a through 1j.
 - b. Upon award of the contract for the improvement by the LA and its approval by the Department, 100 percent of the total fee due for paragraphs 1a through 1j, less any amounts paid under "a" above.
 - c. Upon completion of the improvement and its final acceptance by the Department the total fee due for paragraphs 1k and 1l.

By mutual agreement, partial payments not to exceed 90 percent of the amount earned may be made from time to time as the work progresses.

- 5. That, should the improvement be abandoned at any time after the ENGINEER has performed any part of the services provided for in paragraphs 1a through 1j and prior to the completion of such services the LA shall reimburse the ENGINEER for his actual costs plus percent incurred up to the time he is notified in writing of such abandonment "actual cost" being defined as in paragraph 2 above.
- 6. That, should the LA require changes in any of the detailed plans, specifications, or estimates, except for those required pursuant to paragraph 4 of THE ENGINEER AGREES, after they have been approved by the DEPARTMENT, the LA will pay the ENGINEER for such changes on the basis of actual cost plus percent to cover profit, overhead and readiness to serve "actual cost" being defined as in paragraph 2 above. It is understood that "changes" as used in this paragraph 3 above. It is understood that "changes" as used in this paragraph shall in no way relieve the ENGINEER of his responsibility to prepare a complete and adequate set of plans and specifications.

It is Mutually Agreed,

- 1. That any difference between the ENGINEER and the LA concerning the interpretation of the provisions of this AGREEMENT shall be referred to a committee of disinterested parties consisting of one member appointed by the ENGINEER, one member appointed by the LA and a third member appointed by the two other members for disposition and that the committee's decision shall be final.
- 2. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by the LA upon giving notice in writing to the ENGINEER at his last known post office address. Upon such termination, the ENGINEER shall cause to be delivered to the LA all surveys, permits agreements, preliminary bridge design & hydraulic report, drawings, specifications, partial and completed estimates and data if any from traffic studies and soil survey and subsurface investigations with the understanding that all such material becomes the property of the LA. The ENGINEER shall be paid for any services completed and any services partially completed in accordance with Section 5 of THE LA AGREES.
- 3. That if the contract for construction has not been awarded one year after the acceptance of the plans by the LA and their approval by the DEPARTMENT, the LA will pay the ENGINEER the balance of the engineering fee due to make 100 percent of the total fees due under this AGREEMENT, based on the estimate of cost as prepared by the ENGINEER and approved by the LA and the DEPARTMENT.
- 4. That the ENGINEER warrants that he/she has not employed or retained any company or person other than a bona fide employee working solely for the ENGINEER to solicit or secure this contract and that he/she has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person other than a bona fide employee working solely for the ENGINEER any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gifts or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this contract. For breach or violation of this warranty the LA shall have the right to annul this contract without liability.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have caused this AGREEMENT to be executed in quadruplicate counterparts each of which shall be considered as an original by their duly authorized officers.
